Local Account Factsheet 2014-15 People Affected by Drug and Alcohol Misuse





Problem Drink and Drug use in Hackney

The London Borough of Hackney worked with 2,172 people with substance misuse problems last year including 1,556 people with drug issues and 616 people with alcohol problems.

The London Borough of Hackney Substance Misuse team manage the treatment care packages for 86 Hackney Residents (62 Males, 24 females) who required medical inpatient drug and or alcohol detoxification and/or rehabilitative treatment in 2014-15.

The services that we provide

Between 2013/14 and 2014/15 the total number of Hackney residents in treatment (in-patient and in the community) for heroin misuse increased by 5% compared with a 2% fall nationally. The reasons for this are:

- Hackney is a diverse urban borough with high levels of social deprivation
- The level of complexity of our substance misuse population is higher than the rest of the country and therefore it is not surprising that the patterns of drug use do not reflect the national picture
- Our drug and alcohol services have been committed to proactive and co-ordinated outreach with difficult to engage substance misuse clients, particularly the street-based population, which may have resulted in more heroin (opiate) clients being successfully brought into treatment

Both locally and nationally there was a 2% fall in the number in treatment for non-opiate drug use (including crack cocaine). Drug use remains high among homeless people and sex workers. We are seeing increasing numbers of people misusing cannabis, ketamine and GHB.

People in treatment use fewer illegal drugs, commit less crime, improve their health and manage their lives better. Keeping people in treatment long enough for them to benefit contributes to better outcomes for the person and the wider community.

New Service for 2015-16

The Integrated Substance Misuse Service

The Hackney Integrated Substance Misuse Service (ISMS) will bring together all of the borough's drug and alcohol interventions into one cohesive treatment service that will support Hackney residents who misuse drugs or alcohol to reduce or stop misusing substances, and take positive next steps after recovery. The ISMS will reach out into the heart of the community and provide lots of opportunities to access the service across the borough including satellites in GPs, services in pharmacies, outreach in sexual health clinics and homelessness services.

A treatment centre, run by Westminster Drug Project, will provide community-based services to support people with drug or alcohol problems. Support will be tailored to the need of the individual, and will include key working, Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) and counselling, to address substance

misuse, mental health and other issues. The

provider will work



closely with criminal justice organisations and other partners to ensure the client is receiving appropriate support from other services in the borough.

A clinical hub provided by Central North-West London NHS Foundation Trust will run alongside the treatment centre and will support service users with moderate to high levels of substance misuse requiring specialist clinical interventions. This will include substitute prescribing where appropriate, Harm Reduction and Needle Exchange services as well as testing for blood borne viruses and treatment for health conditions that are linked to substance misuse.

The ISMS will be focused on supporting people who misuse substances to recover and reintegrate with their families and community, with support such as 1-2-1 and group work, services for families and carers, programmes such as Alcoholics and Narcotics Anonymous and peer mentoring. The recovery hub will offer a varied menu of opportunities for development and recovery including a mind, body and spirit curriculum, education, training and employment support and accredited vocational training.





Real Life Story

Mr HT was referred to the Substance Misuse Team by the local Community Alcohol Services (CAS). He is 52 years old with a history of alcohol dependency. He started drinking in his early 20s but in the last few years his drinking has increased and he was drinking up to three quarters of a bottle of Vodka a day. His key worker from CAS reported that, due to his increased drinking and deteriorating behaviour, Mr HT could no longer engage in the community or undertake a community detox, so a substance misuse assessment was carried out to access funding for an in-patient detox and residential rehabilitation programme.

Mr HT has been diagnosed with fatty liver and has abdominal pain due to his liver being swollen. In addition he had other symptoms of withdrawal such as fatigue, nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea.

He reported that he is suffered from depression, and says he has suffered with this for many years. His low periods have increased and he became more vulnerable and impulsive in his behaviour. He was socially isolated having recently separated from his partner of seven years.

A care plan was put in place allowing Mr HT to attend an in-patient detox and structured residential rehabilitation programme. This enabled him to identify the underlying issues of alcohol dependency, address his depression, develop new alcohol free support networks, develop a sober lifestyle and learn how to cope with stress and anxiety. Following his residential detox, Mr HT decided to relocate in order to build a new life in the community, and is involved in adult education courses. Mr HT now lives in an alcohol free housing scheme and has successfully maintained his sobriety, attends AA meetings and is continuing to integrate back into society. He has shown his appreciation of the services and support he received by sending flowers to staff and has personally expressed his thanks to all the team for the support and services he has received.
